he 537-mile walk and its tribute to all those lost in 9/11 — especially his younger brother — is one Frank Siller will never forget.

Dubbed the "Never Forget Walk" from Washington, D.C., to Manhattan, Siller, Tunnel to Towers chief executive officer, culminated his somber journey at Ground Zero on the 20th anniversary of the deadly attacks on the World Trade Center.

Siller made a 537-mile walk from the Pentagon to Ground Zero through six states in six weeks to honor and support first responders and their families.

After a stop on Thursday at his home parish, Blessed Sacrament R.C. Church, West Brighton, and another in Fort Wadsworth for a homecoming barbecue on Friday, Siller completed his journey with a walk through the Hugh Carey (Brooklyn-Battery) Tunnel.

That leg of the journey retraced the footsteps of his late brother, Stephen, an off-duty firefighter who valiantly ran through the tunnel in 2001 and ultimately lost his life as he responded to the World Trade Center attacks.

"All I was thinking about was my brother, of course," said Siller of his walk through the tunnel on Saturday.

"I mean who does what he did? Right? Throws his gear on his back and runs through that tunnel, and I'll tell you, I was walking through there with my family, who I love so much, and I was thinking of his face so vividly and his bald head and his smile. And I'll tell you, I know he was running there and he had one thing in his mind: to help and to save. And he gave it all that day," added Siller as he made the poignant journey on Saturday with a team of family, friends and supporters behind him.

Stephen Siller was one of 343 firefighters who lost their lives in the terrorist attacks.

"And firefighters, we lost 343 firefighters that day, each of their names are right along this wall," Siller told the

Advance/SILive.com about his journey. "And we lost over 60 police officers. They gave their life that day. We lost 2,977, but all those first responders gave their life by running into that building and saving over 20,000 people. And my brother was a part of that, and he'll always be remembered as the firefighter who ran through the tunnel and gave up his life to help others."

THE FOUNDATION

Since then, Siller and his siblings have built the Tunnel to Towers Foundation, which has grown from a grassroots local organization to a national effort that makes sure heroic sacrifices by firefighters and police officers, as well as members of the U.S. military, are rewarded. In 2011 Siller made an announcement that the foundation would build a smart home for every "catastrophically injured service member."

Over the years, the foundation has built more than 100 smart homes for severely injured U.S. military members.

"When somebody goes to serve our country, or our communities, and they give their kids a kiss goodbye, and they don't come home, we're going to take care of the families left behind," said Siller. "We're going to deliver them a mortgage-free home, or we're going to pay off their mortgage if they have a home."

THE WALK

"I think it's because everyone's spirits have carried me, especially my brother Stephen's spirit," Siller told the Advance/SILive.com last month as he walked through the hills of Pennsylvania as part of the Never Forget Walk.

Throughout the walk, Siller has been encouraging Americans to "never forget" the sacrifices of the nearly 3,000 Americans murdered by the events of 9/11 — including his brother. His second goal is to encourage 1 million supporters to sign on to donate \$11 a month to the Tunnel to Towers Foundation.

Frank Cafaro recognized with prestigious Minty Award

The Spirit of St. Genesius Award is given to individuals who have strongly supported The Minty Organization for the Performing Arts schools' performing arts programs and have made a lasting impact on students' lives. This award recognizes educators and mentors that have been involved in Minty Organization schools outside a traditional director/musical director/choreographer role.

Since 1974, Frank Cafaro, AFSC, has been a presence behind the scenes — and on stage — at St. Peter's Boys High School. Born and raised on Staten Island, Frank attended St. John Villa Elementary School, New Dorp High School, and St. John's University. In 1973, Frank began his tenure at St. Peter's teaching history and religion while also serving as a guidance counselor. After a two-year stint as Dean of Students at St. John's, he returned to St. Peter's in 1983 and became Director of Guidance and moderator of the student council and hockey team while serving as the Driver's Ed teacher.

The 1998 Lasallian Educator of the Year, he served on the Lasallian Christian Brothers Mission Counsel for New York from 1999 to 2011. In 2018, he was presented with the Letters of Affiliation to The Institute of the Brothers of the Christian Schools with November 5, 2018, proclaimed as "Frank Cafaro Day" in Staten Island.

A constant and strong presence in the St. Peter's Boys' drama program, Frank began his work backstage in 1974 during the tenure of legendary impresario Carl William Lesch. Over the course of the next four decades, Frank would also appear in cameo roles in "The Most Happy Fella," "Brigadoon," "My Fair Lady," "Sugar," "Paint Your Wagon," "On the Town," "South Pacific," "The Music Man," "Damn Yankees" and "West Side Story."

"Anyone who walks through the doors of St. Peter's knows Mr. Frank Cafaro. So it is no surprise that he has often graced our





stage," said Michael Taccetta, current director of St. Peter's Drama. "His love and compassion for theatre shines through to our students not just in all his support behind the scenes but onstage as well. Keep an eye out for him in our upcoming production of 'Guys and Dolls' this May!"

We congratulate Frank on nearly a half-century of dedication to St. Peter's and the Performing Arts!

was a true man of steel at IRONMAN Florida 2021

Published in Staten Island Advance by Charlie De Biase Jr., 11/9/21 Reilly Walsh '15 is a former Jaques Award winner who averaged 25.0 points a game his senior year.

The former St. Peter's hoops star also went on to play college basketball at the New Jersey Institute of Technology, a Division 1 program.

Is there a degree of difficulty when you're playing at that type of level? Sure there is. In one way or another, you're playing with a target on your back.

But any three-point shot attempt with a hand in his face or double-team he might have experienced against St. Raymond's or Cardinal Hayes, for instance, likely pales in comparison to the obstacles Walsh encountered while competing in last Saturday's IRONMAN Florida 2021 competition.



"I never thought in a million years I'd be doing something like this, even going into the (competition)," said Walsh of the long-distance triathlon, which is widely considered one of the most difficult sporting events on the planet. "But I was prepared and had a great support system that obviously worked."

Walsh competed in the 2.4-mile swim, 112-mile bike and 26.22-mile run for the first time in Panama City Beach, Fla., and not only finished with an impressive time of 9:46.51, but, incredibly, finished first in his age group of 18-24-years-old. In addition, he placed 42nd overall out of a whopping 1,696 people who actually finished the event.

The most recent average time for men completing the grueling race is 12:38.

And what does the lifelong West Brighton resident get for placing so high? Well, he qualified for the IRONMAN World Champs in Kona, Hawaii, between Oct. 6-8, 2022.

Not too shabby.

"I'm going to take a little bit of time off now, rest my body because I am a little beat up," laughed Walsh, who fully plans on competing in Hawaii next year. "I'll be getting back to it soon, but I'm going to rest up first."

Walsh's road to competing in the highly popular triathlon started almost a year ago when he decided to sign up for IRONMAN Maryland, which took place this past September. However, he was forced to switch to Florida, which was approximately two months after the Maryland event, after he sustained an ankle injury while training at an Olympic distance-event in the Poconos last June.

WHY IRONMAN?

The 24-year-old said his decision to take part in an IRONMAN competition was a combination of two things.

"First, I was looking for a new challenge. I wanted to push myself to try something different," he said. "But then I also saw a YouTube video of a guy named Nick Bare," he added. "He had a documentary on his IRONMAN training. He was doing it for his mother, who had cancer. That really hit home for me."

Walsh's mom, Christine, is a breast cancer survivor who has been in remission for three years.

"My mom was in the same exact situation, so there was a parallel to (Bare) in that way," explained Walsh. "It just hit home. I watched his video, then went right to the website and signed up.

"It 100 percent inspired me (to compete). I was there for my mom's treatments and they were some difficult times. She taught me what it means to persevere. And (competing in the IRONMAN) doesn't compare to what someone with cancer goes through."

SECOND-TO-NONE SUPPORT

Walsh, who began training last January, was initially in contact with Jenny Driscoll, another former hoopster and family friend who is also the daughter and niece of his former coaches at St. Peter's. Denis Driscoll, Jenny's dad, was Walsh's freshman coach while Charlie Driscoll, Jenny's uncle, was his varsity coach.

Jenny Driscoll was the perfect person to speak to because she competed in IRONMAN Lake Placid in 2017.

"She took me under her wings," acknowledged Walsh, who also heaped praise on eventual training partner Stephen O'Driscoll,

a fellow Islander and St. Peter's alum. "(Jenny) showed me the ropes."

But Walsh's path to IRONMAN success was really enhanced when he took on Robert Pollastro, the president of the NYPD Triathlon team, as a trainer.

"He helped me immensely," said Walsh of Pollastro, a former record-breaking swimmer in college. "I really had no idea what I was doing (when I started) and he trained me from day 1. He was exactly what I needed to get me ready for this event."

ROUND-THE-CLOCK TRAINING

The 6-foot-3 Walsh, who is a business analyst for RiskVal Financial Solutions in Manhattan, began training for an approximate total of 20 hours a week when 2021 hit. On weekdays, he'd be up at 5 a.m., train, work at home between 7:30 a.m.-5:30 p.m., then train again when his shift was over.

He also trained extensively on weekends.

"Running was the most natural since I did it for years with basketball and, although it was years ago, I did swim competitively when I was a kid," he said. "It was getting used to biking that was the challenge. I never biked like this before, certainly not the way i had to bike last Saturday."

Walsh arrived in Panama City Beach on Nov. 3. He was aware that his parents, Christine and John, as well as Sue and Paul Driscoll, his aunt and uncle, would be meeting him in Florida. But he was surprised by Jenny Driscoll on race day.

"It was really cool to have them all down there," said Walsh. "I went into (the event) with the intention of just finishing. That was my first goal and anything else was just a plus."

His family met him at various spots over the course of his time competing. And they helped support him in other ways as well.

"I could hear my dad yelling things like (my time) and when I had a couple of miles to go," he laughed.

Then, there was crossing the finish line, the realization he achieved his goal — and then some — and meeting his family afterwards.

"There was a lot of emotion, some tears of joy for sure," said Walsh.

"Over 10 months of work put into it and it all came to fruition.

"But it wasn't just me competing," he added matter-of-factly. "I was obviously the one racing, but there was everyone else helping me behind the scenes.


"It was a spectacular feeling."

Coach John Tobin Way:

Late X-C and track mentor gets his due with street naming

The late John Tobin '56 loved his hot dogs.

That's why a hot dog cart was on hand Sunday during a street naming for the legendary Island high school cross country and track & field coach on the corner of Oakland Avenue and Nutly Place in West Brighton.

The name "Coach John Tobin Way" is now visible at the intersection of the two North Shore blocks.

"If you ever asked John Tobin 'would you like a hamburger or hotdog?' his response would have been 'I'll take 3 hotdogs!'," said Denise Boccia, a friend of Tobin's and the administrative director of SI Elite Track & Field. "Miss him terribly!"

Boccia was one of more than 200 family, friends, peers, former athletes and students who turned out for the 1 p.m. ceremony.

Alice Tobin, John's widow opened the ceremony by thanking Boccia, Bill Welsh and Jeff Benjamin, who led the campaign for the street naming.

The Rev. Terry Troia led everyone in The Celtic Prayer for the poor in honor of Tobin and remembered the man who put the community first.

"His vision of a school for all led to his leadership in creating and continuing the New World Order Prep School," said Troia. Commemorative T-shirts and journal books that Alice Tobin and Boccia worked on, were handed out.

Of course, the many in attendance gobbled up hot dogs and then pizza, provided by neighbor James McBratney, owner of Jimmy Max, as part of the refreshment menu.

Tobin, who passed in September of 2019 at the age of 80, was a St. Peter's High School and Manhattan College track alum, who would go on to coach at Peter's as well as Port Richmond and Tottenville. He coached notable athletes such as Pete Whitehouse, Artie Evans and Joe Ferrante and won numerous local and city championships.

Several of the St. Peter's alumni coached by Tobin were in attendance, including Marty Gray, who led the ceremonial bagpipe players.

"One of the greatest gifts Coach Tobin will leave is his legacy and what better



way to continue his love of the sport by creating a lasting scholarship for active graduating senior scholar-athletes in cross country high school," said Boccia. "I'll be sending over the application to SIHST&F Association to distribute to all SI High School cross country coaches for athletes to apply for the 2021 season."

Tobin's fingerprints on Island road racing goes back decades.

In 1957, he and his close friend, Welsh, created the Staten Island High School Track & Field Association.

"There never will be a coach as interested as John Tobin in the complete athlete -- body and soul, athlete and school citizen," said Welsh. "He was a father to anyone who ran for him. I learned from John."

The longtime NYC educator was a driving force in the New York Empire State Games and the New York City Big Apple Games, and was honored with the Staten Island Advance's Service Award in 1968.

Kevin Tobin, one of Tobin's six children, was in attendance and said his dad taught him to give generously.

"Dad taught us to give back and you would get it back tenfold," he said. "He always told us that tough times don't last, tough people do!"

St. Peter's cross country alum and captain Ed Grippe called John Tobin his mentor.

"Coach Tobin was my best coach and mentor," said Grippe. "A leader who inspired excellence and a mentor both on and off the track."

Billy Bates, a St. Peter's track alum, said, "As a freshman, John Tobin was our coach and as a senior John Tobin was our friend. He taught us to push through pain both in running and life...he took a group of boys and made us men."

Longtime friend and Port Richmond colleague Angelo Aponte said Tobin's "monument is the people here whose lives he has affected and who continue to affect people's lives to this day."

Judge Mike Brennan, John Tobin's brotherin-law, summed up the day the best

"John, this day's for you," said Brennan.
"The sun didn't always shine on your face, but you dealt with life in great dignity and honor and respect for other people."
